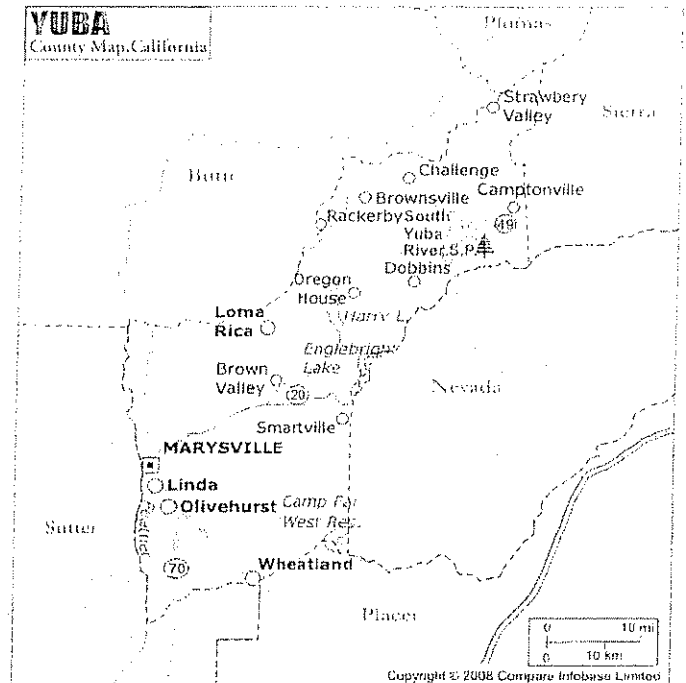
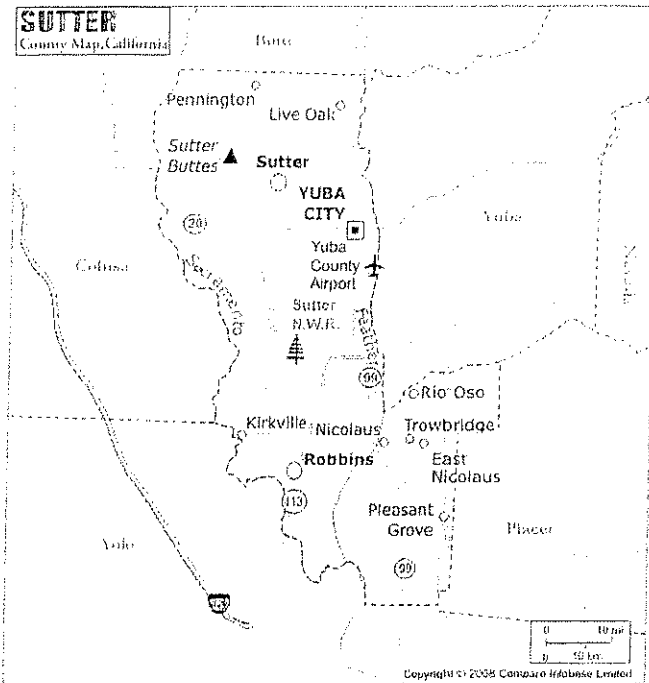

It's Your Successful Parole Choice

Your return home from State prison will give you a lot more freedom. How well you do on parole will be your responsibility. You have choices to make about how you live your life. It is very important for you to find a good, steady job and a stable residence. If you have drug problems, want counseling, or need to see a doctor for a health problem, ask your parole agent to help you find these services in the community. There are many agencies in the community that will help you find a job, housing, food, and other services. In many ways, your willingness to find assistance in the community will help you be successful on parole.

You must obey all federal, state, county and city laws. You must immediately notify your parole agent if you are arrested, cited, or released on own recognizance for any crime. If you break the law, your parole can be violated even if you are not charged with a crime or convicted in court.

You are not to be around firearms, items that look like real firearms, bullets, or any weapons. You may not possess a knife with blade exceeding two inches in length. Kitchen knives must be kept in your kitchen and not hidden, for example, in your bedroom. Knives used for work are also permitted but can only be in your possession while you are at work. When traveling to work and from work, knives must be in a locked box and placed in the trunk of the car.

If you live or work where firearms, simulated firearms, bullets, weapons, crossbows, or unauthorized knives are kept, you may be returned to custody for up to one year with no good or work time credits. You shall not own, use, or have access to a weapon listed Penal Code Section 12020.

Some weapons listed under Penal Code Section 12020 are:

- Cane gun or wallet gun
- Any simulated firearm that a reasonable person would believe to be a firearm.
- Ammunition containing explosives or a flechette dart.
- Blackjack, slingshot, billy, nunchaku, or sandclub, sandbag, sawed off shotgun, metal knuckles.
- Explosives of any kind.

Examples of knives related to employment would be:

- Carpet knife for a carpet layer.
- Knives used for /in agriculture field work.
- With your parole agent's written approval, knives used in employment may be carried only while being used at work or to and from the job. It is illegal to carry them at any other time.

For more information, ask your parole agent to discuss Penal Code Section 12020 with you. You must sign the conditions of parole. Failure to do so can result in the revocation of your parole.

Improving Your Reading Skills

If you want to improve your reading skills, you can obtain help at your neighborhood public library. Thousands of parolees have increased their reading ability through the help of local schools and libraries. Many parole offices have Computer Assisted Learning Centers available. Ask your parole agent for more information on these centers.

Getting An Education

If you did not obtain your high school diploma, you may have a tough time finding a good job with good pay. If you want a good job, you can still finish your education by obtaining a General Education Development (GED) diploma through your neighborhood Adult Educational Program. These programs are free of charge and are offered at a school near your home.

If you want to get your high school diploma, you can do so by going back to school. You may also get your diploma by passing a High School Proficiency Test.

If you dropped out of school, you can find a variety of educational programs to help you. You can find out about these programs by contacting your local school district or community college.

Vocational Training

You may be able to get vocational skills training and money to live on while you go to training. By becoming a student at a local community college, you can learn a trade and get job with a good salary. Community colleges can train you and give you a certificate of training in auto mechanics, computers, carpentry, plumbing, and other fields. You may not need a high school diploma to begin this training. Ask your parole agent for help in finding out about vocational training available in your area.

- Attitude is important.
- You control your attitude.
- A positive attitude can help you while in State Prison and on Parole.
- Attitude controls how you see people and how people see you. People respond to you based on your attitude.
- A positive attitude can make good things happen.
- A positive attitude can help you in obtaining employment.
- A positive attitude can help you in your relationships with friends and loved ones.
- A positive attitude will help you feel better about yourself.

Restraining Orders

Police Assistance

These are orders from the court telling a person to stay away from another person. If the person violates the order, you can have him/her arrested.

- If you are physically harmed, call the police. You can have the attacker arrested.
- If your restraining order is violated, call the police. You can have the person arrested.

Three Strikes, You're Out Notification

Governor Wilson signed California's "Three Strikes" measure into law on March 7, 1994. The "Three Strikes" law applies to anyone who has one or more prior serious or violent felony convictions. These convictions are called "strikes."

There are mandatory sentences in "Three Strikes" cases.

- **Mandatory Doubled Sentence.** If you have one prior "strike" your prison term for the new felony conviction will be doubled.
- **Mandatory Life Sentence.** If you have two or more prior "strikes", your term for the new felony conviction will be a minimum of 25 years to life in prison.
- **Mandatory State Prison.** The judge will sentence you to State prison. No probation, no county jail, no California youth Authority, and no California Rehabilitation Center (CRC).
- **Mandatory Consecutive Sentences.** All of your new convictions must be sentenced consecutively. No concurrent sentences.
- **Maximum 20 Percent Conduct Credits.** You must serve at least 80 percent of your new sentence before you may be paroled.

What crimes are "strikes"?

- A list of the serious and violent crimes is found in Penal Code (PC) Sections 667.5 (c) and 1192.7 (c).

Does your new felony conviction have to be serious or violent for you to be punished under "Three Strikes?"

- No, any new felony conviction will require a "Three Strikes" sentence to a minimum of 25 years to life in State prison for a new felony conviction like the following: (1) Possession of a weapon by an inmate (PC Section 4502); (2) Escape or attempted escape from prison (PC section 4530); or (3) Possession of drugs or paraphernalia while in prison or jail (PC Section 4573.8).

Does a prior serious or violent conviction which occurred before March 7, 1994 count as a "strikes"?

- Yes, prior serious or violent convictions occurring before March 7, 1994 are counted as "strikes." If you were convicted of a serious or violent felony before "Three Strikes" became law on March 7, 1994, that conviction will make the "Three Strikes" law apply to you if you commit any new felony.

How long do prior convictions count as "strikes"?

- Forever. There is no washout period under "Three Strikes."

Is a prior serious or violent felony conviction counted as a "strike" even if it occurred in another state or in the federal courts?

- Yes. Out of state and federal convictions for serious or violent felonies are counted as "strikes."

Is a prior serious or violent felony conviction a "strike" even if you didn't go to prison for that conviction?

- Yes. Your prior conviction of a serious or violent felony will count as a "strike" no matter what sentence you received for the prior conviction.

Do juvenile adjudications count as "strikes"?

- Yes. A juvenile adjudication of a serious or violent felony may count as a "strike" under "Three Strikes".

Finding Counseling

In some areas there are inpatient (live-in) substance abuse programs that will provide help to you. If you know or think you have a problem, get in a program. The parole office has additional information on substance abuse programs. Ask your parole agent about programs in your neighborhood.

Parole Outpatient Clinics (POC)

Parole Outpatient Clinics (POC) are administered by the Deputy Director, Division of Adult Parole Operations. There is a POC program operating within each parole region reporting administratively to the Regional Parole Administrator and functionally to the Mental Health Program Administrator in Parole Headquarters. POC consists of staff psychologist(s) or psychiatrist(s) who provide group or individual counseling. Discuss POC with your parole agent.

Depending upon your criminal history, you may be required to attend POC. You may be referred to parenting classes or domestic violence classes if your parole agent requires it. All convicted sex offenders shall be referred to POC for evaluation (and treatment if deemed appropriate).

County Health Department

County Health Departments have offices of mental health. Counseling is available through mental health on a crisis basis, self referral, or a referral from your parole agent.

Narcotics & Alcoholics Anonymous (NA/AA)

Narcotics and Alcoholics Anonymous (NA/AA) groups meet daily (day and evening). These groups offer help and support for those in need. They will help you stay sober. Check the telephone book for listings or ask your parole agent.

Rational Recovery Groups (Al-Anon & Nar-Anon)

Rational Recovery Groups (Al-Anon and Nar-Anon) are organizations for families of alcohol and narcotic abusers. It is recommended that families of alcoholics or narcotic abusers be involved in these support groups. Contact Al-Anon, Nar-Anon or your parole agent for further information.

It is the goal of the Parole and Community Team (PACT) goal to provide you with information and services to assist you in your transition back into the community. Utilizing the services provided in this handbook will assist you in completing your parole requirements and becoming a productive member of society.

Please remember that phone numbers change, agencies move or discontinue and other changes occur. Please check the phone numbers regularly to be sure they are accurate. We have tried to make sure these are current, but current is only as of the date of this publication and will be revised periodically.

DMV issues two types of ID cards. A regular ID card is valid for six years, and a senior citizen ID card is valid for 10 years. To qualify for a senior citizen ID card, you must be age 62 or older. To apply for an ID card or renew your ID card, you will need to do the following:

- Visit a DMV office make an appointment for faster service.
- **Complete application form DL 44. An original DL 44 form must be submitted. Copies will not be accepted.**
- Give a thumb print.
- Have your picture taken.
- Provide your social security number. It will be verified with the Social Security Administration while you are in the office.
- Verify your birth date and legal presence. you may use your California driver license.
- Pay the \$20 application fee. There is no fee for a senior citizen ID card.
- Double check your address before you leave DMV and tell the DMV representative if your address is incorrect. Your new ID will be mailed to you within 60 days. If you have not received your ID after 60 days, call 1-800-777-0133 to check the status. Have your receipt and/or old ID card with you to provide information when requested.
- DMV will exchange a valid license for a no-fee ID card to drivers who are no longer able to drive safely because of a physical or mental condition. Please call your local DMV for additional information.



CRIMINAL RECORD

What Is A Criminal Record?

A criminal record, formally know as a summary criminal history, or more commonly know as a “rap” sheet, is a list of arrests and convictions. Anytime the police fingerprint you because of a criminal investigation, that information is added to your summary criminal history. The history also lists all your criminal convictions, including the date of the convictions, charges, sentences, and whether the crime was a felony or a misdemeanor. If you entered and successfully completed a “diversion” program, the history should indicate that as well.

How To Find Out A Summary of Your Criminal History?

- **Request your record:** You may request your record in 2 ways by letter or application...
 - Letter: Write letter to California Department of Justices including your name, address to which you want the record sent to, and why you need the record. (You are allowed to see your own record)
 - Application: You can get it either at a local police or sheriff's department or from the California Department of Justice. Forms are available by calling (916) 227-3849 or on the web at: <http://ag.ca.gov/fingerprints/forms/AQCSSCHR.pdf>
- **Pay an application fee:** As of January 2006, the fee was \$25.00. You must send a check or money order. **DO NOT** send cash. Make check payable to the California Department of Justice.
- **Mail the application:** Mail the request letter or application and your check or money order to:

- **Get Fingerprinted:** After the DOJ receives your application, it will send you a “Live Scan” fingerprint card and a list of locations to have your fingerprints “imaged” (digitally photographed). A list of “Live Scan” locations is also available on the web at: <http://ag.ca.gov/fingerprints/publications/contact.htm>.
- **How can I get my records if I cannot afford the fee?**
If you cannot afford the fee, you may request a waiver. Fill out a “Application for Fee Waiver” form or attaching a separate letter that requests a waiver of the fee. In the letter or application, you must state that you cannot afford the fee because you are poor, and you must include some proof of information. You may be able to simply explain how much you make a month and what your expenses are (rent & utilities). You should include a copy of your pay stubs or bank statements. **DO NOT** send original documents.

VICTIM RESTITUTION

What is Restitution?

Restitution is part of your sentence and it is ordered by the court. It is read out loud in court along with your terms of confinement. Restitution means **“paying back.”** A law dictionary defines restitution as an, **“act of restoring ; restoration; restoration of anything to its rightful owner; the act of making good or giving equivalent for any loss, damage or injury.”** The purpose of restitution is to help victims recover from any financial hardship caused due to your criminal activity. Restitution may cover medical bills, funeral expenses, and the cost of repairing damaged property.

Types of Restitution

Judges are required by state law to order restitution in every criminal case. Your current ability to pay is NOT a consideration of the court. There are two types of restitution: **Restitution Fines and Direct Orders**. Both types of restitution can be ordered in a single case.

- **Restitution Fines:** Usually range from \$200 to \$10,000. The judge decides what you will pay. Penal Code §1202.4 addresses restitution fines and §1202.45 indicates that an additional fine for the same amount may be imposed if you violate parole. Court documents often "stay" the parole fine until you violate; however, the original fine is due right away. To stay means only until a violation occurs. For example, you may have a \$200 fine and if you violate you would owe \$400.
- **Direct Orders:** Are specifically for victim losses because of the crime(s) committed against them. It is possible for many victims to receive Direct Orders on a case. Direct Orders can be for any dollar amount and is considered a money judgment (civil) and may be collected as such (wage, garnishment, liens) after a person is released from prison. The Judge decides what you will pay. The court will determine how much the victim(s) can receive based on the amount of their loss. The California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) collect the money and the Victims Compensation Fund assures that the victim receives it.

Payment Options

The CDCR garnishes 30 percent of deposits to inmate trust accounts to pay restitution ordered by the court. The CDCR can also take 30 percent of earned prison wages to collect court ordered restitution. Direct orders are collect first, then restitution fines are collected. It is your responsibility to keep track of how much money has been taken from you while at different institutions. If you make payments somewhere other than the institution, receipts as proof of payment must be provided.

Restitution does not stop when you parole. If you parole or discharge and then receive a new prison term or parole violation, CDCR will continue to collect all unpaid restitution. Parolees need to determine a way to pay their outstanding restitution balance. If not paid voluntarily, it will eventually be collected—possibly through a tax intercept.

Restitution has no statute of limitations. This means that there is no time limit for collection. It is an outstanding debt even after an offender is discharged from CDCR's jurisdiction.

An offender wishing to fulfill their parole term in another state (usually because of a job or family support) may not leave California until ALL restitution has been paid in full.

Under Federal statutes, (11 USC §523(a)(7)) restitution is NOT discharged under bankruptcy.

If you plan to parole in another state, either you or your parole agent must contact the Office of Victim and Survivor Services to request an accurate balance. Your Trust Office printout is NOT used for this purpose. All payment should be made with a money order or cashier's check while on parole and sent to:

Your name and CDC number must be included to accurately credit your balance. A receipt for all money received is faxed to your agent. A zero balance must be reached before transfer papers can be submitted to the Interstate Unit.

The following payment procedures apply specifically to parolees who have outstanding court-ordered restitution fines and/or direct orders of restitution:

- Obtain from your Parole Agent a current "Statement of Restitution Obligations" (SRO), provided by the Office of Victim and Survivor Services (OVSS). The SRO contains the total restitution payoff for all outstanding restitution which includes the 10% administrative fee authorized in Penal Code Section 2085.5.
- Purchase a cashier's check or money order, payable to the **California Department of Corrections-Restitution**. Personal checks will have a 30-day hold placed on the funds to ensure the check clears the bank.
- Write on your cashier's check, money order, or personal check your:

- Attach a copy of your SRO (if available) to your cashier's check, money order, or personal check.
- Payment will only be accepted by mail at the following address:

- A receipt is faxed to your parole agent only after FULL payment has been received and posted to your restitution account

IMPORTANT NOTICE: In accordance with Penal Code Section 11177.2, all outstanding restitution fines and direct orders of restitution must be paid before a parolee may transfer his/her parole term out of California. The Interstate Parole unit will not accept Transfer Investigation Requests (TIRs) unless all outstanding restitution fines and direct orders are paid in full. TIRs submitted without proof of payment from OVSS will be returned resulting in delays for approval of your out of state transfer request.
